Rationale for and justification of need for the project:

The Fairtrade Textile Standard was published in 2016 and is due for review according the regular review cycle. The locally-led Cotton and Textile coalition advises for a revision of the standard that looks into reformulating the offer for textiles in an evolving market, which is fit for purpose and is able to generate traction and growth for the product category.

The commitment needed from actors in the supply chain to all requirements of the standard incl. ambitious requirements on Living wage etc., led to a rather slow uptake of the standard by potential supply chains. The review will consider initial ideas on how the standard can be adapted so that it is practical for all actors in the supply chain, including those where Fairtrade operations are still a very small part of their business and those that are only involved in a very small part of the whole process; as a result make implementation more accessible and thus ultimately bring more benefits to all workers. The review of the textile standard needs to also consider and include the evolving external regulations such as HREDD laws in the EU, and at the same time voluntary governmental schemes such as the Green Button in Germany which influence the shaping of requirements for operators in the whole textile supply chain.

Risk assessment:

1. The high ambition of the Fairtrade Textile Standard hinders practical implementation on the ground and thus potentially restricts progress towards living wage and other benefits of the standard.

Mitigation: Careful evaluation of the producer and supply chain reality and ambitions of the Standard and find a middle ground through consultation with all actors. All recommendations from the Fairtrade Textile Standard: Pre-Consultation Research – Final Proposals will be taken into account.

2. Due to the limited number of certified entities, the consultation might not be representative for textile operators in general.

Mitigation: Consultation with all certified operators and include potential interested parties as much as possible, including consultation with actors from civil society and all interested parties.

Project Goal:

The revision of the Fairtrade Textile Standard is a key instrument to align the standard with the market needs and producer realities. The revision will focus on developing a standard that is practical for implementation for all supply chain actors and seeking to bring as much benefit to as many workers as possible. The revision will incorporate the learnings of the first years of implementation, update and align it with external regulatory and market developments.

Objectives

- Address all topics captured in the Monitoring Log of the Textile Standard
- Incorporate requirements on Human Rights and Environmental Due Diligence
- Assess external regulations and schemes relevant for the development of Fairtrade Standards
- Address topics and recommendations from the pre-consultation research study, particularly looking at:
 - o redeveloping the offer to reach larger impact for workers;
 - practicality for the industry to adopt;
 - market needs and comparison with other schemes, this includes the following topics:
 - > Supply Chain
 - > Certification Requirements for Additional Entities
 - Living Wage
 - Responsible Fibers
 - Geographic Scope
 - Worker Rights and Empowerment
 - > Environmental/Climate Requirements
